How does wonder take root, and how might it grow? What does it mean to look—and look again—through the eyes of poetry? How may we connect the spell of walking, step by step, with the spell of words?

Stay at Civitella Ranieri's 15th-century castle in Umbria, Italy, while exploring the lyric of wonder with Alice Oswald, Joanna Klink, and Matthew Bevis as guides. The fourth residency in this popular series will be devoted to poetry, gardens, plants, and walks, and will include generative workshops, craft lectures fireside conversations, excursions to organic growers, medieval gardens, farmers' markets, an ancient orchard, and more.

To apply, submit 10 pages of poetry and a cover letter no later than November 30, 2025. Matthew Bevis teaches literature at the University of Oxford. His books include *Comedy:* A *Very Short Introduction* (2012), *Wordsworth's Fun* (2019), and *Edward Lear*, *Moment to Moment* (2022). His essays have appeared in *Poetry*, *The London Review of Books*, *The New York Review of Books*, *Raritan*, and *Harper's*. He is currently finishing a book on some versions of wonder: *Then Again: Notes on Lyric*.



Joanna Klink is the author of five books of poetry, including *Circadian* (2007), *Raptus* (2010), *Excerpts from a Secret Prophecy* (2015), and *The Nightfields* (2020). She teaches at the Michener Center for Writers in Austin, Texas, and has received awards and fellowships from the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the Guggenheim Foundation. Her new book, *Days and Chances*, is forthcoming in 2026.



Alice Oswald has published several books of poetry, including *Dart* (2002), *Woods etc.* (2005), *Weeds and Wild Flowers* (2009), *Memorial* (2011), *Falling Awake* (2016), and *A Short Story of Falling* (2020). She originally trained as a gardener but took the post of Oxford Professor of Poetry in 2019, and she now teaches a course in oral traditions with the Schumacher Wild Foundation.

## WHAT'S INCLUDED


The sum of \$4,750 USD per person is all-inclusive, covering lodging at Civitella Ranieri for nine nights, pick-up and drop-off from Perugia to and from the Castle, all group ground transportation, excursions, entrance fees, lunch and dinner daily, wines, workshops, and lectures. There are double-occupancy rooms available for a reduced price of \$4,250 USD per person.

Upon acceptance of your application, a \$1,000 deposit to secure your registration is due by December 1, 2025. The remaining balance (\$3,750/\$3,250) is due no later than January 19, 2026.
